Parents receive their child's secondary school offer

More than 13,500 pupils who are due to start secondary school in Essex in September 2019 have been offered their parents' top preference of school.

Families across the county will discover the outcome of their secondary school applications, with those who applied online getting confirmation by email or via the Essex County Council website.

Thanks to investment in new school places, with three new secondary schools due to admit into Year 7 for the first time this September, 84 per cent of pupils have been offered their first preference of school.

A further 9 per cent have been offered their second preference, meaning 93 per cent have been offered either their first or second preference.

The latest statistics come after the council set out its plans to invest in a further 2,198 new secondary school places in its 2019 /20 budget.

Cllr Ray Gooding, Essex County Council's Cabinet Member for Education, said: "I am delighted that, once again, we have been able to offer so many pupils their preferred secondary school place. This is testimony to our strong track record of investing in new school places, as well as the hard work of admissions staff, schools and those involved in planning expansions."

Finchingfield Bridge replacement planning

Essex Highways engineers have been carrying out investigative trial holes and extracting cores from the material below the bridge this week. The cores and other findings will now be reviewed to inform plans to replace the bridge.

This work was delayed from October 2018 due to reasons beyond the control of Essex County Council. The delay means that the major work to demolish the existing bridge and re-build a similar-looking bridge in keeping with the historic look of the village is now likely to start in 2020. Further information on the programme will be released as the replacement design progresses.

Councillor Kevin Bentley, Deputy Leader and Cabinet Member for Infrastructure, said: "This is absolutely necessary work, which must be done as soon as it can be practically arranged. We very much understand there are concerns regarding the work and the proposed closure, which is why we are continually talking to the relevant councils and with them to various local individuals."
